We rise from our work and leisure to bring healing and hope to others. In the shadowed evenings of our fears and worries, the Spirit is with us.


The Light of life is shines on us in every moment of every day.

Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, "Do you come peaceably?" He said, "Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice." And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

GOSPEL READING

John 9:1-34

9 As he walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask, "Is this not the man who used to sit and beg?" Some were saying, "I is he." Others were saying, "No, but it is someone like him." He kept saying, "I am the man." But they kept asking him, "Then how were your eyes opened?" He answered, "The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' Then I went and washed and received my sight." They said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I do not know."

13 They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them, "He put mud on my

eyes. Then I washed, and now I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not observe the sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs?" And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened." He said, "He is a prophet." The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight 19 and asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?" His parents answered, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind; but we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him; he is of age. He will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews; for the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him, "Give glory to God! We know that this man is a sinner." He answered, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." They said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples?" Then they reviled him, saying, "You are his disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from." The man answered, "Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from, and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." They answered him, "You were born entirely in sins, and are you trying to teach us?" And they drove him out.

Keep these words in your heart. The Lord is our God, the Lord alone.



Denise Dunbar-Perkins retired in 2017 from Abbott-Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis where she served as a Board Certified, Staff Chaplain in both the Oncology and Cardiovascular units, along with being an adjunct teacher in the Clinical Pastoral Education Program. A graduate of United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities, she is one of the original founding members of Kwanzaa Community Church PC (USA) (now Liberty Presbyterian) in North Minneapolis, the only African American Presbyterian Church in Minnesota. In



the last 29 years, within the church, she has served locally, nationally and internationally as a speaker, teacher, preacher, workshop leader, curriculum writer and worship leader. She has also served as Bridge Pastor or covered the pastor's sabbatical for several local churches. Additionally, she has been Parish Associate for both Oak Grove Presbyterian Church, Bloomington and Westminster Presbyterian Church, Minneapolis. Denise is a past Moderator of the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area and has previously served as a member or Chair of several presbytery and synod committees and is currently serving as the Liaison for Immigrant Fellowship Communities. Additionally, she was a GA Commissioner for the 221st gathering in Detroit and in the past, an adjunct professor at United Seminary.

Denise grew up on the Southside of Chicago, the youngest of five siblings and now resides in Red Wing, Minnesota with her spouse, the Rev. Dr. Herbert Perkins, currently the pastor of St. Paul's United Church of Christ in Ellsworth, Wisconsin. They are also the proud parents to Yuki, their 10 year old Shih Tzu, who serves as the honorary church dog!
